Matters Discussed

1. General updates

1.1. Crime and Corruption Commission

- Business as usual.
- The Commission is still looking into the lobbying space.



















1.2. Public Service Commission

- Support public sector agencies to effectively manage their workforces:
 - Bridgman review Public sector reform stage 2. Being led by the Department of the Premier and Cabinet and will soon start an examination (through a committee involving agency and union representatives) of the ethics framework.
 - MOHRI (Minimum Obligatory Human Resource Information) reporting –
 non-binary employees now being reported census planned for July to
 August to allow non-binary staff to alter their gender in employee records.
 - o Working for Queensland survey to occur in September.
- Build a highly capable and responsive public sector workforce:
 - o HR Capability Uplift increasing capability of HR across the sector.
 - Increasing mobility across the sector including using technology platforms e.g. Talent Now.
 - o Leadership ANSOG and IPAA.
 - People matters course delivered through AIM again to increase capability.
- Support the public sector to prepare for and respond to strategic workforce challenges:
 - Imminent appointment of a special Commissioner for Equity and Diversity.
 - o Inclusion and diversity strategies.
 - o Savings and Debt Plan FTE management.
 - o Refresh of the 3 Year Strategic Roadmap.

1.3. Queensland Audit Office

- Office has tabled 18+ reports in Parliament this current financial year, new work plan released in May with 25 reports to Parliament planned to be tabled in the 2022 financial year.
- Attended the Western Queensland Alliance Council Assembly 2021.

1.4. Office of the Independent Assessor

- OIA has received 1,060 complaints about Queensland Mayors and Councillors and completed 270 misconduct investigations so far this year. Another 219 matters are currently under investigation. In 2020-21, 73% of misconduct investigations have been completed within six months.
- OIA has referred 47 matters involving 77 allegations to the Councillor Conduct Tribunal (CCT).
- 14 matters have been decided by the CCT involving 11 Councillors. Allegations against nine Councillors were sustained.



















1.5. Office of the Information Commissioner

- Open by Design Australian theme for 2021 International Access to Information Day on 28 September which will include the Solomon Lecture.

1.7. Electoral Commission of Queensland
